Summary of Motions Approved at Grand Lodge

1. The SP7 Committee shall present a full proposal including all necessary documentation for establishing a Charitable Foundation to the next Grand Communication.
2. The 1992 Grand Communication shall be held in Red Deer.
3. The 1991 Grand Communication shall be held on June 7th and 8th, 1991 in Calgary (this is one week early).

Constitutional Amendments

4. Section 102 is amended to exclude Honorary Life Members from the Special Reserve Fund assessment.
5. Sections 501, 501(2) and 708 are amended to allow for the optional office of "Piper" in Craft Lodges.
6. Sections 15, 16, 16A, 28(11) and 28(2) are amended to make the office of Grand Master an automatic progression from Deputy Grand Master without further election.
7. Section 1012(4) is amended to have members of a Research Lodge seek benevolence from their other Alberta Lodge(s).

It should be noted that eight motions were not in order and were, therefore, not presented for consideration. The Lodges presenting these motions had failed to take advantage of the generous offer of the Jurisprudence Committee to help draft suitable motions by correcting any proposals sent. Next year, if your Lodge failed to have its motion presented, or a new motion is developed, send the draft to the Jurisprudence Committee through the Grand Secretary and gain their expert advice so that your motion at least gets consideration by the Craft.

Did You Know?

Next time a Grand Lodge Officer is in your Lodge, look at his metal chain collar. The number of stars is significant. The Grand Master has nine stars; the D.G.M. has seven stars, the D.D.G.M.'s and elected officers have five stars and all appointed officers have three stars. Metal lodge collars have eight stars.

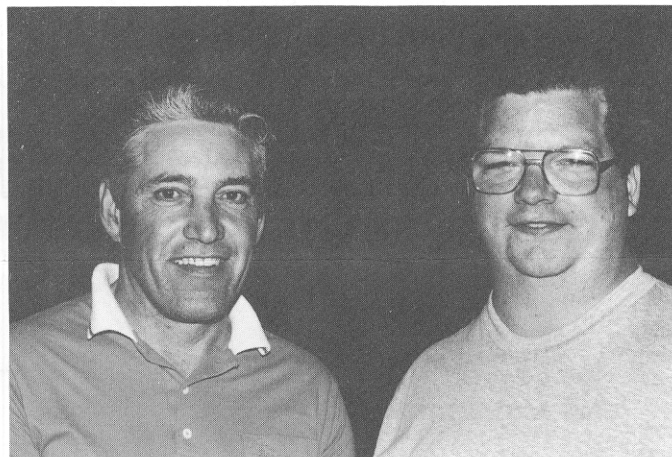
Fiat Lux Lodge of Research

Make 1990 the year you attend to have a part in the making of Alberta Masonic History as the Masonic Spring Workshop celebrates its 25th year in Banff.

Answer to the Question of the Month for May

The question related to the Fellowcraft Ruffians knowing the Third Degree penalties. The explanation given by Carr in *The Freemason at Work* is derived from *Masonry Dissected*, 1730 and two popular exposures of 1760 and 1762.

First, *Masonry Dissected* gives an elaborate EA Obligation embodying all the penalties. Carr then states that the Third Degree is really the story of the supposed evolution of the Third Degree, so that the degree is telling how the words and signs arose. He states that this explains the fact that when the Third Degree came into being it was by the old EA Degree being split into two parts and the FC Degree material being automatically made the Third Degree. It is then assumed additional material was developed in about 1725 to make the narrative complete. It should be noted that prior to 1696 the FC also knew the F.P.O.F. Carr observes that in the early French texts of the period 1744 to 1751, "nine Masters" were sent to search for H.A., so the illogicality did not exist.

— MASONIC TOUR OPPORTUNITIES —

(plus typographical apologies)

The following tour outlines appeared in your June Grand Lodge Bulletin. With a flash of utter brilliance I managed to include a most critical typographical error in the return address shown on the reverse side. In spite of myself some responses reached us. To those who had theirs returned, I apologize. The address is now correct.

The list of tours shown below are in the preliminary stage of development. Each has its own special flavour and for each there is shown a brief description, potential Masonic content, approximate cost and tentative time frame.

Should 1 or more of these tours be of interest you, please indicate on the reverse side and return it to the address shown. More complete information will then be forwarded to you.

THE ORIENT (3 weeks)—Hong Kong, Bangkok & Singapore including a day into mainland China. In Hong Kong & Singapore you may visit a Scottish, Irish or English constitution lodge. This tour should go in mid-Feb/1990. Cost about \$3,500 per person including all airfares and hotels plus all breakfasts.

AUSTRALIA/N.Z. (3 weeks)—Not a repeat of this year's tour, rather a look at Perth, Adelaide, Hobart, Sydney, Melbourne and northern New Zealand. The occasion is the centenary of the G.L. of Tasmania. Mid-Feb departure & cost around \$3,700.

ISRAEL—Your input is necessary here. If there is sufficient interest I will pursue it further and check it personally. The Masonic opportunities are obvious. No dates or costs established until I have your indications.

ALASKA/YUKON (2+ weeks)—4 day cruise between Alaska & Vanc. preceded by a land tour of Whitehorse, Dawson & Fairbanks with Masonic visits possible at each and perhaps on board ship. This tour will likely go in early Sep/1990. Cost approximately \$2,800.

SWITZERLAND/RIV. (3 weeks)—Arrival in Geneva, through Albertville(1992 Olympics) to the Riviera then through the Italian lake region to Switzerland with a possible 4 day Mediterranean cruise from Monte Carlo. This will be a May/1990 tour costing \$3,800 dependant upon the cruise. If the cruise is waived the cost will be less.
