"It Rains"

It was the custom among the English Freemasons of the mid 19th century, when conversing together on the subject of Masonry, to warn of the approach of the profane (non-Mason) by announcing in a whining expression, "It rains."

The phrase was used to indicate that a Cowan (an eavesdropper or spy) was present and the topic must be suspended. It is derived from an ancient punishment of an eavesdropper, which was to place the culprit under the eaves of a house in rainy weather and keep him there until the dripping water ran in at his collar and out at his shoes.
