Question of the Month

What is a Scald Miserable Mason?

Editor's note: The answers to the Question of the Month will now appear two months following the questions, due to the production time of one Bulletin overlapping the circulation of the previous Bulletin. This will allow more time to receive answers or comments.

Further Answers to the Question of the Month for October.

The question was "Which way should the "G" face?"

A most interesting letter and explanation was received from Bro. David Currie of Kirkaldy, Fife, Scotland in which he points out that the location of the "G" is given in his Ritual but there is no reference to direction. He further notes that the "G" in Canongate Kilwinning No. 2 is attached horizontally, exactly mid-way between floor and ceiling, the volumetric centre of the Lodge. He bases a strong argument on this fact and the various other locations which the "G" occupies — that it does not matter which way it faces, for the "G" represents "that source of light from which all goodness emanates" and a light source gives offits energy in every direction. The "G" being purely a symbol can face any way and, like the Masonic ring there is no right or wrong way, just argument over choice.

Calvin Shaver, who took part in the Degree and was made an Honorary Member of the team and named Chief Executive Officer of the Railroaders' Degree Team.

The degree team was started by W.Bro. Don Capper and when he passed to the Grand Lodge Above, the team was under the direction of W.Bro. Harry Adams until his death. W.Bro. Ron Goodman then took charge of the team and has continued to make "Railroad Night" such a significant event in Lodge life by keeping the team 'on track.'

Over the years, the team has been presented with many railroading memorabilia but the most prized possessions are a steam locomotive bell and a piece of ordinal track originally laid in the Calgary area.

Be Prepared

Everyone should make preparations so that, should you pass on, your wife, sons or daughters, or some member of your immediate family should have knowledge of the whereabouts of your will and other important papers. They should also have knowledge of your Masonic connections. Make notes in your effects requesting that they notify the Secretaries of each of the Masonic Bodies to which you belong, should you be called away by death.

Regularly, some death notices are not received until the Secretary receives a response from a widow or family member replying to a Dues Notice sent to a last known address. This can be exceedingly embarrassing to the widow or family, and to the Secretary, to learn at a later date, of the death of a member. We earnestly solicit your co-operation in this matter. You will be rendering a great service to your family by removing this chance for embarrassment.

Blood

It is the time of the year when the Red Cross is seeking donations to keep up its stock of blood. Have you donated yet? If you are a reasonably young Mason (less than 60) in good health, why not take up this form of charity. To give money is sometimes a pain but also the easy way out; to give blood is truly to give of yourself.

At a recent awards presentation to donors in Calgary, there was recognition of those who had given 35,50,75,100 and 200 donations — yes 200! It was noticeable that a number of Masons were amongst those who received awards and who were personally congratulated by the Lieutenant Governor of Alberta, The Honourable Gordon Towers, P.G.M.

If you are not willing to be a donor yourself, why not contact the Red Cross and offer to set up a blood drive in your community — in the Lodge Hall if necessary.

The gift of blood is truly a gift of life to the recipient in many cases. Few donations you ever make can be as significant.

Lodge Discussion Topic


