### The Southern Baptist Convention Vs World-Wide Freemasonry

Freemasons the world over are now aware of this turning point for modern Freemasonry. After nearly a year of careful, scholarly study, the United States' largest Protestant denomination of over 15 million members (Southern Baptists) has officially declared that membership in Freemasonry must remain what it has always been, "A matter of personal conscience."

For the past year there have been virulent attacks on the Masons, some of which have spread into Canada, and more specifically, into Kelowna. These attacks accuse Masonry and the Masons of everything from "secular humanism" and "heresy" to "devil worship" and "Satanism." Freemasonry has a heritage of silence in the face of attack, but the sheer volume of the attacks from the Southern Baptists was so severe that Masonry has responded.

The splinter group of the Southern Baptists who condemn Masonry do not speak for this large Protestant group, since in the final vote, this June 23<sup>rd</sup>, the Motion was defeated in favour of the Masons by a ratio of 9 to 1.

The Masonic world has watched the progress of this splinter group with some concern, since it was the greatest threat to Masonry since the Roman Catholic Pope excommunicated Masons in [1738], because he suspected plotting against the church. With the vote defeating the motion,

the Baptist Convention has actually joined Freemasonry in its elevation of individual conscience as the guide to personal beliefs and actions, which is another way of stating what the Masons have said all along — that "An individual's personal beliefs must dictate his choice whether he join Freemasonry or not." Some of the organizers of the Southern Baptist Convention and the church organization are Freemasons of high order and they state that, "Being a Mason has made me a better person and a Christian."

It appears that a great many Southern Baptists, as well as people right here in Kelowna, do not realize that a Shriner is also a Freemason (or Mason) and that organization does a great deal of good works of which Burn Hospitals, Children's Hospitals and Cancer volunteer work are only a few. Also, that Freemasonry is **NOT** a religion.

Masons all over the world congratulate the Southern Baptist Convention on the conclusion reached following their research into Freemasonry. That conclusion is in accordance with the traditional and highly commendable insistence in the Southern Baptist Convention that each person must decide issues in faith for him, or her self.

#### **Points To Consider**

The young Mason who desires to study the workings of the various degrees, should bear in mind the following points:

- 1 Proficiency comes by diligent study.
- 2 Fluency is the result of constant practice.
- 3 Clear utterance is desirable at all times. The beautiful phraseology of a charge is frequently marred by indistinctiveness and mumbling form of speech.
- 4 Study the best Masters. Note their emphasis and follow them at all times.
- 5 Cultivate deliberation in speech. There is no need to hurry. Have confidence in yourself and you will impress the person you are addressing.
- 6 Begin with a small part and make yourself master of it. Then proceed to a larger part, frequently revising as you progress. Only in this way will ease and proficiency be attained.
- 7 Tell the Master that you would like to be permitted to have a share in the working of a Degree. If the Master knows his business, he will at once grant your request and encourage you to be interested.
- 8 Be ready at all time to assist the Master. Successful lodges are those in which every member is ready and willing to work.
- 9 Be punctual in attendance. Recognize that the success of the lodge is in your hands and it is your duty to give to your Mother Lodge your best service.
- 10 Be ready to take the place of an absent Officer. He is happy Master who can call upon a brother at anytime.
- 11 Never forget that your lodge has a reputation to keep.
- 12 Be a "Mason" always, not only when the lodge is tiled.

Masonic history was made January 1, 1993, when a float entitled "Masons in Music" appeared in the Tournament of Roses Parade, in Pasadena, CA. The parade and television audiences viewing this numbered in the millions. All costs were defrayed, thanks to financial support from 16 Grand Lodges of North America, five from other countries, and other Masonic organizations and individuals. Plans for and construction of the 1994 float are well under way. The float, entitled "Builders of Democracy" because of Masonry's major contributions to the creation of democracy throughout the world, will feature giant symbols of Masonry. A contest will be held to choose a look-alike George Washington who will ride the float, along with one of democracy's newest leaders: the G.M. of Romania; the International Master Councillor of DeMolay, on its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary; and a yet to be selected celebrity. #### **Letter To The Editor**

How selective are we when we interview a candidate? Do we truly investigate the man, not only from the standpoint of his moral conduct but also to determine where his personal priorities lie. Is he ready to make a commitment of attendance to his lodge? Does he truly wish to join the Fraternity and make a contribution, by participating in most activities? Or is he using the lodge as a 'spring board' to other concordant bodies and then ultimately to the Shrine? Do we want "quality or quantity?

Our selection of officers in some cases leaves a lot to be desired. I have sat in some lodges where the Master has read every obligation, every charge and every question to be asked of the candidate. I have also observed officers being prompted on every second line whilst attempting to deliver a single paragraph. How can any lodge expect good and continual attendance when sloppy and shoddy work takes place continuously? Members stay away in droves because, to them, it is an ordeal. In order for an officer to be proficient in his work, he first of all must have a criteria to work to a high standard and that is usually demonstrated by the more practised officers ahead of him.

Not everyone is officer material and our Fraternity

There are many great Masons who have never wished to grace the officers' chairs because they knew of their limitations for the work required, but they have made great contributions to our Fraternity in other ways and are still continuing to do so.

When I first became accepted into the Fraternity I was thrilled to think that I was to become a member of a well respected group of men that in some respects was rather exclusive. As I attended lodge each meeting, I was rather in awe with the work that took place as each degree was performed faultlessly by the officers and other members participating, for they were performed with dignity and precision — this is what keeps members coming back. Let us not think in terms of numbers, but in quality; let us get Masonry back where it is a privilege and an honour to be allowed to join our ranks; let us be very selective when we invite a brother to start in the chairs; and above all, let us not be a "turnstile" for those whose only desire is to proceed, without concern for their lodge, to another concordant body.

So, when we muse about how we are going to enhance our Fraternity, let us look at what we are perhaps doing wrong within our lodges. Let us start back at the basics, as Masonry once was.

#### **Answer To September's Question**

The question asked what date was used for the basis of a lodge's anniversaries.

There is a requirement to differentiate between the many words used at the 'set up' of a lodge. The first thing is that a group of Masons meet to determine if a new lodge is viable. From this meeting or meetings, they petition for a dispensation to operate. Subject to no objection, they are **instituted** and operate **Under Dispensation (U.D.)** for a period of time, to prove to the Grand Lodge that they are worthy of being granted the right to operate as a regular lodge. The lodge (U.D.), after no less than six months, petitions for a **Charter** (Warrant) which, if approved, will be granted at a Grand Communication. Following receipt of the Warrant the lodge arranges for its **Consecration and Constitution** to be carried out by the GM or his designate. It is at this ceremony that the Warrant is read and presented.

**Consecration** is the offering or dedicating a lodge to God, by separating it from common use. Our ceremony requires corn, wine and oil.

Constitution is the declaration by the Grand Master that the Officers are installed, the lodge Consecrated and that the Warrant issued is now in force. The lodge at this time has all the rights and privileges of a Regular lodge within that jurisdiction.

The anniversaries of a lodge should be based on the date of **constitution** as no lodge is 'regular' until this date.

### The Lodge At Heritage Park

Many readers are familiar with **Heritage Park** in Calgary, having visited or even helped man the **Masonic Lodge** in the historical village at some time. The March 1993 issue of the Bulletin carried an article describing the facility.

Each year volunteers are enlisted from the Calgary area to work in the Lodge Room for a day to meet visitors and to introduce them to the Lodge. Through these volunteers, many of whom were from surrounding rural communit we have availed ourselves of the opportunity to introduce some facets of Masonry to the public.

This introduction has generally involved Masonry as it is today but, now, Heritage Park is adopting a new concept. Volunteers (there are hundreds) in other areas of the Park are enjoying being trained to assume the role of town residents appropriate to the turn-of-the-century Alberta.

Once the total transformation is complete, visitors will experience a "stepping back in time" and will leave the Park with a deeper understanding of the life and times of our ancestors and predecessors.

Unfortunately, our current method of recruitment and one-day volunteer system does not provide people with some knowledge of the history of the Order in Alberta nor of Alberta itself. To execute this change we hope to establish a core of interested Masons who are ready to learn, and even to seek out, the history of the Lodge; brethren who enjoy meeting the public; brethren able and willing to give more than one day of their time during the season. These volunteers would also receive training from, and work with, the Historical Interpretative Department of the Park.

If any readers are interested in becoming a part of this exciting venture; if they have, through their own acquaintances, knowledge of early Alberta Masonry; if they have relevant literature or artifacts, would they please cont W.Bro.
